

LLB with Honours – 2016 entry

Duration of programme: 4 years

Award on successful completion: Bachelor of Laws with Honours

Location of delivery: Abertay University, Bell Street, Dundee

Accreditation: The Law Society of Scotland; The Faculty of Advocates

Composition of the programme: 120 SCQF (Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework) credits in each academic year, delivered in modules of 20 credits each, with 3 modules taken in term 1, and 3 in term 2 each year. In years 1 and 2, students have the opportunity to take modules outside their main subject. A 40 credit independent dissertation is included in the final year.

Contact hours and workload: Each academic year typically requires 1200 hours of student effort; on average across the 4 years of this programme, 23% of that time is in lectures, seminars and similar activities; the remainder is independent study.

Assessment methods: This programme uses exams, coursework, presentations and a range of practical oral and written assessments which develop students' ability to present sophisticated arguments and complex information. Examinations or class tests feature in the majority of accredited subjects in Years 1-3.
